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Ex With Assault Rifle Fatally Shot

Sheriff's Office Investigating Woman's Act As Possible Self-defense

Staff Report

Frank Harrison, 45, address unknown, was fatally shot around 10:23 p.m. on June 17 when he arrived armed with an assault rifle at the home of his ex-girlfriend, the Pasco Sheriff's Office said.

Harrison had reportedly previously threatened to do harm to Alejandrina Guinn, 38, the PSO said.

Guinn, who had armed herself with a handgun, reportedly opened the door of her home at 5547 Armstrong St. and shot Harrison, according to the PSO

Guinn is cooperating with investigators. The shooting is being investigated as a possible case

of self-defense.

State correctional records indicate Harrison has been a convicted felon for more than 12 years and could not legally possess a firearm.

He was convicted for third-degree homicide in 2003 after he fatally shot Shane Lani Sampson earlier that year when a shotgun he was holding went off. The blast hit Sampson, who was 23, in the stomach. The court found it was apparent Harrison had not intended to shoot Sampson but,

The Silver Oaks community showed its Flag Day spirit by honoring the five branches of the military and the City of Zephyrhills.

Five flag poles were erected at the entrance of the community where each of the flags of the United States military branches will fly with the American flag. Flying beneath the American Flag is now the official flag of the City of Zephyrhills.

In an abbreviated program that was moved indoors, members of the community celebrated the new flag poles and the city flag presentation as part of a revitalization project within Silver Oaks.

City officials approved the flag design roughly five years ago, but it wasn't until now that it has flown anywhere in the city.

because he was a convicted felon, he was in illegal possession of a firearm when the shooting occurred.

Harrison had only been out of prison for 10 months when he was shot by Guinn, authorities said.

Recent the changes Florida Legislature made to the Stand Your Ground law will make it necessary for the State Attorney's Office to prove Guinn had another course of action she could have taken to protect herself.

Prosecutors opposed the revised Stand Your Ground law that Gov. Rick Scott signed on June 10. Many said the revision would make it more difficult to convict people who committed acts of violence and then claimed self-defense.

Previously, the shooter had to prove their actions were justified under the

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law the state first enacted in 2005.

That was the case when Curtis Reeves Jr., 74, a retired Tampa police captain, asserted a Stand Your Ground defense regarding his alleged fatal shooting of Chad Oulson, 43, on June 13, 2014.

Reeves is charged with seconddegree murder and aggravated battery.

He allegedly shot Oulson after the two men argued over Oulson using a cell phone to send text messages during previews being shown prior to the start of a movie at the Grove Cobb 16 theater in Wesley Chapel.

Pinellas-Pasco Circuit Judge Susan Barthle denied Reeves' Stand Your Ground defense on March 10 and he will stand trial for the two offenses. If convicted, he could be sentenced to a minimum of 25 years in prison.



Originally founded in 1950, Joy-Lan is one of less than 10 drive-ins remaining in the state, including the Lakeland theater.


Spears kept a dying breed of entertainment alive for all of us and fortunately, we took advantage of his passion for the movies.

and this is going to be the downtown, live music place to go."


The café was just a breakfast/lunch eatery when it opened in March, but that quickly changed to have the doors open for dinner and evening entertainment.

Every year, Flag Day is honored to recognize the history behind the iconic stars and stripes of the United States flag. On June 14, members of the American House Zephyrhills and American Legion Post #15 in Dade City honored the flag and all it stands for by engaging locals with some patriotic fanfare.

American House Zephyrhills residents, staff and guests all adorned in red, white and blue gathered outside the facility's main entrance at 11:45 a.m. to watch the flag ascend. Afterwards, all were invited into the lavishly decorated dining room to partake in a patriotic lunch of hot dogs and hamburgers while local band Elwood's Trio provided some mood

Since the facility became American House, it has hosted a number of events sporting the "American" theme. Executive Director Virginia Rice loves to see the smiles such ceremonies bring to the faces of her residents and to members of the community.

"Flag Day is an American House tradition," said Rice. "Anytime we have a patriotic event, the Zephyrhills community embraces it with positive attendance."

But, unfortunately, some of us fought under that flag to give people that right to express themselves."

The event concluded with the disposal of worn and weathered flags collected from the community. Almost 300 flags were burned in the traditional fashion. Many may balk at the idea of burning a symbol of country, but Gorecki and his fellow veterans see it as an act of the utmost respect.

"That way we know it's destroyed properly," Gorecki explained. "It's not going to go to a landfill under a heap of garbage. Cremation is the way a veteran usually goes; the flag goes the same way."

Both events embodied the spirit of true patriotism. Just as the flag served as a source of inspiration for veterans as they fought bravely in grueling battles for our freedom, it acts as a symbol of hope for others in today's trying times.

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Surplus Items Bring City Thousands

Only One Desk Remaining After Auction

When auctioneer Robert Milic shouted "Sold" for the final time on Tuesday, the city netted \$7,600 from the surplus items.

The treasure trove consisted of old computers, office furniture, electrical devices, a lightbar from a police car, paintings, clocks and hundreds of other assorted items.

Many of them had been tucked away in storage for years and the rest were deemed unnecessary for use when the new City Hall opens in 2018.

Milic, of Tampa Liquidation Center, LLC, has more than 30 years of experience as an auctioneer. His skill was apparent as he stood on a ladder, high above the crowd, while the auction was held in the former city council chambers at 5335 Eighth St.

Using a microphone to bark out suggested prices, Milic cajoled the approximately 30 bidders and pointed at them while trying to get them to bid higher. It worked in some cases when bidders became competitive in their quest to buy that special item they had set their eyes on.

Arjay Morgan was particularly happy with one of the items he won during the two-hour auction.

"I ran against (Councilwoman) Liz Geiger and she won by one vote," Morgan said of the 2004 election. "I couldn't win a council seat, so I bought one for \$10."

It only took him 13 years to get it.

Ian Anderson outbid others for some computers on Tuesday. He had carefully inspected many of them during a two-hour preview for bidders before the auction started promptly at 10 a.m.

Anderson operates the New Port

Richey-based AndersonTech. He said he avoided many of the computers with damaged capacitors because he didn't want to repair them. He was looking for good equipment he could quickly resell, Anderson explained.

A light bar that had once graced the roof of a Zephyrhills Police Department cruiser was purchased by Semanco Enterprises. Since Semanco Enterprises is a Thonotosassa-based auction company, there's a good chance the light bar may be back on the auction block soon.

Total sales were close to \$8,400 as winning bidders had to pay a 10 percent premium on their purchases. Tampa Liquidation received close to \$800 for conducting the auction.

Karen Miller, of the city's purchasing department, said she was pleased with the money the city received through the auction. Miller suggested holding the auction when city leaders were pondering what to do with all the surplus items.

Space is limited at the City Hall Annex, located at 5344 Ninth St., where most of the offices relocated to from the old City Hall. It wasn't practical to keep items because much of the equipment wouldn't meet the city's needs after work is completed on the new City Hall.

"We just figured it'd be a good way to get a little money back from these items," City Manager Steve Spina previously told the Zephyrhills Free Press. "We've got a lot of old equipment that we've had for years.

Including, it appears, the one desk that didn't sell on Tuesday.
